remarkable convergence of events occurred quite recently. The news was full of talk about President Obama's impending visit to Hiroshima while, at the very same time, a delegation from Hiroshima, led by an 89-year-old survivor of our 1945 bombing of that city, visited the Garden.

They brought with them, and planted in the Garden, a camellia that is a second-generation offshoot of a camellia that survived the seeming total devastation caused by our dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima.

A large gathering, including the Consul General of Japan in Los Angeles, Harry Horinouchi, attended the installation ceremony in the Garden. The most moving and memorable moments occurred when the

89-year-old survivor described the horror he lived through on August 6, 1945.

We feel deeply honored to have been selected as one of several sites in the United States to have received a survivor plant. Twenty-seven countries, so far, have received plants descended from original survivors.

As guardians of this reminder of the cataclysmic horror of the 1940s, we feel grateful to be able to share Green Legacy's hope for peace, embodied in their gift of this resilient camellia. 🔨

GENEROUS DONORS ADD BEAUTY & INTEREST TO THE GARDEN

hat is Chucho, our garden manager and authority on almost all growing and living things, with Wendy, our intrepid volunteer and assistant, outfitted in chest-high waders standing in cold winter water catching a donation of 24 Koi fish from the Earl Burns Miller Japanese Garden in Long Beach.

Two more wonderful donations followed. Elizabeth Thurber in Eagle Rock gave us 15 Koi and most recently Yashio Namiki gave us his entire collection of 23 prize-winning Koi!

Now when the water lilies of summer retire for the winter, the ponds will still provide the patient observer glistening displays of gold, silver and bronze, and



bright mixtures of red, orange, cream, and black. Each Koi has a unique palette of color and design.

The observer will not see our Koi as easily as in some ponds for they don't come to the surface to be fed. Chucho maintains a natural

ecosystem with the addition of microorganisms, the basis for all life. And he carefully monitors the balance of plant life that cleans, filters and cools the water.

Add to this mix, thousands of other beneficial organisms and the ponds are a thriving environment providing all the needed nutrients for the Koi and all manner of life that flies, crawls, and swims.
